On behalf of ourselves and our associates, do Petition that a certain Tract of Land on the West side of Connecticut River within our Province of New York, which was discovered to be vacant and unpatented, be granted unto us and our associates.

The aforesaid Lands were never granted under our Province of New Hampshire and are bounded on the west by a tract of land called Stamford and on the south by the Province of Massachusetts Bay.

We present this petition to our trusty and well beloved Cadwallader Colden, Esquire, our Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of our said Province of New York in America.

This tract of land contains thirty thousand Acres, the actual survey of which was procured at considerable Expense. All of the tract lies within our Province of New York beginning at the southwest corner of the town of Stamford at the marked Beech tree.

This land, which will be divided into thirty equal Parts, is forever hereafter to be called and known by the name

Cadwallader Colden, in our city of New York
the thirteenth day of November in the year
one thousand seven hundred and Sixty nine
